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This is certainly the case in *Educating Rita*, in which two characters from contrasting social backgrounds (Frank is upper class and highly educated, while Rita is lower-middle class with a spotty education) interact with each other and develop insight into and empathy for each other's worldviews. The disparity between the social classes in the play illustrates social remnants left over from Victorian England (1837–1901), the period during which Queen Victoria (1819–1901) ruled.
